BACA's 21st ANNUAL FILM AND VIDEO FESTIVAL!!!!

SCREENINGS OF FILM AND VIDEO WINNERS REVEALED AFTER MONTH-LONG DELIBERATIONS

After one-month of screenings and careful deliberations, during which time some 175 works were scanned, the screening schedule of selected films and video have been announced in the 21st ANNUAL FILM AND VIDEO FESTIVAL sponsored by BACA/THE BROOKLYN ARTS COUNCIL. Close to 100 jurors, all professionals in the field, were involved in this year's Festival, one that attracted a close to record-breaking number of entrants from all over the world.

Documentaries, narrative works, animation, experimental videos, and more, will now be shown at such prominent sites as: The Metropolitan Museum of Art, Millennium, The Jefferson Market Library, BACA Downtown, The Brooklyn Museum, among others. BACA's FILM AND VIDEO FESTIVAL is made possible through the support of IBM, Parkers' Lighthouse, and the N.Y.C. Dept. of Cultural Affairs. The program is coordinated by BACA with the New York Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, and with additional support from Long Island University-Brooklyn Campus, The New School, and The Brooklyn Museum. The event has been organized, this year, by Chuck Reichenthal, BACA Program Director; John Russell, BACA Program Assistant; and Elaine Lamont, of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, among many others.

Prominent panelists from the New York Chapter of NATAS, along with other major professional names in film and video, met at The New School, Long Island University, and The Brooklyn Museum for a period of over four weeks to screen entered works. A vigorous scoring procedure was followed, and selected works were chosen after critical

tabulations were held. BACA's FILM AND VIDEO FESTIVAL started in 1967 as part of BACA's initial season of summer events at Prospect Park. The event recognizes recently-produced works of less than 60-minutes in length. This year, works were received from as far away as Japan and Canada.

Over the years, scores of now-prominent names in the film and video worlds showed their initial works at the Festival, among them Danny DeVito, and Oscar winners Nigel Noble and Ira Wohl. With that in mind, several individuals were cited this year for Special BACA CERTIFICAT OF MERIT. BACA Certificates for EMERGING ARTISTS HONORS for 1988 go to: DAVID ALLISON & RAY WANG, of New Canaan, Ct., for "The Geometry of Love"; TONY MORTILLARO, of Woodland Hills, CA., for "Legends of Doo-Wop"; KEITH FIALCOWITZ, of Los Angeles, for "Rabbit"; and two residents o Brooklyn -- PAUL B. HOLZMAN for :The Locust" and MICHAEL LUKE LATINO for "A Man's Race". BACA SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT CERTIFICATES are given to film and video artists whose 'growth and abilities deserve special commendation'. This year, the honors go to: LES BLANK, of California who is represented this year by two important works - "Gap-Toothed Women" and "Ziveli"; and to DAVID EHRLICH, represented this year by the honored "Academy Leader Variations".
